Usage scenarios

Mr. Williams goes to the pharmacy to buy his new medication. Since it's the first time he's using the iPillOClock, he asks the pharmacist to help him programing the device. The pharmacist connects the device to his computer, launches an application and configures the device according to the Mr. Williams's medications and therapy.

Mrs. Jones is a elderly lady who has lived alone for many years since his son has moved to a far away city looking for a job. One day she falls from the ladders and can't stand up again by itself. Using the *iPillOClock, Mrs. Jones can quickly call for* help and go to the hospital to check if she has some broken bone.

Mr Brown's doctor confirmed his patient's allergy to a certain common substance. With this new information, the doctor connects the Mr. Brown's iPillOClock to his own pc, and edits Mr. Brown's medical record adding the new allergy's <u>information.</u>

Mr. Wilson's daughter is concerned with the fact that his father is constantly forgetting to go to the pharmacy to buy more medicines when they end up. Using the iPillOClock peripherical device, she programs the iPillOClock to warn her father when he has medicines for less than a week.
